

# THE SCHOOL SPORTS DAY will be held on Wednesday 11<sup>th</sup> June and the SUMMER FAIR will be held on Friday 11<sup>th</sup> July from 15.45

**PARISH COUNCIL** Both the Monthly Parish Council Meeting for May 2025 *and* the Parish Council Annual Meeting (AGM) will be held in the Hamilton Hall on **Wednesday 14<sup>th</sup> May**, as displayed on the official poster. Unfortunate timing and prevarication over the format of the evening has meant that this issue of The Times of Tetford may be delivered after the event.

Preceding these meetings, also to be held on Wednesday 14<sup>th</sup> May and starting at 6.30pm in the Hamilton Hall, the *Annual Parish (Residents') Meeting* is an event for all the village, and <u>all residents</u> should attend.

This is because the Council will present its annual report to the residents, village-wide issues will be discussed and it is hoped that our District Councillor, Daniel Simpson, and our new County Councillor for Louth Wolds, Alex McGonigle, will attend, in order to justify their existence, clarify what the latest election result implies and explain how they intend to improve life for all of us.

**VANDALISM IN TETFORD** Two incidents of vandalism have been reported to the magazine this month. The 30mph speed limit sign on the telegraph pole outside the School in North Road has had the bottom left-hand corner of it broken off. It was found lying on the grass below. It would have taken quite a lot of strength to break it off, so is unlikely to have been done by a youngster. Also, it seems that someone has deliberately broken the front timber rail of the wooden bench seat immediately outside the Village Surgery, possibly by jumping on it.


New this year is a craft section too:

## THE BEST EXOTIC SRI LANKAN HOTEL

As I sit on the plane home reminiscing, I now understand why our neighbours in Tetford have disappeared to this neck of the woods each winter/spring, for months at a time and even lived there for a while.



Our trip started at Negombo peninsular near Colombo with lagoon one side and Indian Ocean the other, street dogs and pups played in the crashing surf. On leaving, we stopped at a rather potent dried fish market, where a whole flock of

Egrets watched intently as the men brought ashore the latest catch.



Dambulla 1st century caves, a UN world heritage site followed,

although the coach did have to stop to allow the wild elephant on the roadside to miss the oncoming traffic which was giving it a very sensible wide berth. At the receiving hotel, we even had an elephant waiting for us on the bed (the very rare towel kind).

At our next destination, we climbed the 600 foot towering Sigiriya rock (aka Lion Rock). The Royal Botanical



Gardens near Kandy were next, where we saw a tree planted by our late great Queen Elizabeth, before visiting the temple where people in searing heat queued



for 6-12 hours to see Buddha's actual tooth. Eagles soared overhead watching for any unaccompanied flagging children.

We then stopped off for a cup of Ceylon tea at a plantation, before ascending with amazing views to 7000 feet in Nuwara Eliya, nicknamed 'Little England' where the climate was cool,

just like a hot summer's day could get used to it, we Ravana Elle waterfall where nicknamed Scary Spice a British couple jived away. Macaques (monkeys with dismay whilst chomping on drinking half full bottles of



back home. Before you were off again via the a local one man band murdered a few tunes as 'The local Toque toupées) watched in their corn cobs and discarded Tango!

The next day felt like one of those TV travel competitions, where we travelled by bullock and cart ride down a very bumpy dirt track (knew I'd packed that Preparation H cream for a reason!), before disembarking to awaiting paddle boat, then onto our final evening entertainment by Tuk Tuk. What was it? Yes, it was a brightly coloured local drum/dance/fire breathing/hot coal walking variety act with no requirement for Health and Safety apparently...just a smell of spent kerosene and 'singed' eyebrows.

Next on the cards was a trip with lots of 'oohs and aahs' up call/visit to Yala National saw the elusive Leopard. crocodile, hornbills, eagles, peacocks and mongoose



to a baby elephant sanctuary followed by a 4.30am wake Park where some lucky folk Still, the water buffalo, kingfishers, dancing made up for it for me.

Back on the coach we headed off via the old Dutch Fort (circa 1668) at Galle, stopping at a



daytime bat colony on the way before arriving at our final hotel in Kalutera on the coast. Here we took another optional boat tour via mangroves; locals demonstrated cinnamon bark collection before heading off to see/hold Monica, one of the locals at the Victor Hasselblad Turtle preservation centre.

We ended the holiday with a seafood platter at a local beach BBQ, followed by dancing. Just as we we're leaving, a fellow traveller decided to let her hair down along with most of her clothes and leapt into the water. I thought Group Accountants would have known better! Someone else commented "Why is it always the ones that you don't want to take their clothes off!"



This island was alive 24/7, with most of the abundant fish, bird and mammal life probably living on constant high alert of being something's next snack. Our tour guide had been previously stung on both cheeks by a friendly scorpion, had a giant millipede down his shirt and a 10 foot crocodile in one of the hotel swimming pools. My last experience was being a few feet away from the 'Mother of all Water Monitor Lizards', a 7 foot dinosaur in the stream behind the last hotel.

All I can say is "What a place!" If variety is the spice of life, then that is Sri Lanka!

#### The Men on the Tetford War Memorial by Jonty Wild

#### Stoker 1st Class 288420, 1/5th Bn. Royal Navy. Died 10/05/1916, aged 35.

Ernest was born on July 10<sup>th</sup>, 1878, in the Newport area of Lincoln, and was the first child of John Sutton Clarke and his wife Harriet, born in Lincoln and Marston respectively and married in 1876. Ernest had three younger siblings.

In 1881 the family were living with Harriet's parents, William and Elizabeth Leighton, in the hamlet of Kingthorpe, Lincs. Harriet's father was a farm bailiff, employing six labourers and six boys. John was working as a machine erector.

By 1891 they had moved to Church House, Christ's Hospital Terrace, Lincoln. John was now a threshing machine erector. All the Clarke family listed above were present, plus Hetty Williamson, their 'general servant domestic'.

The census does not always explain the family situation, and this is the case in 1901. His father was found boarding at 69 Ashbourne Close, Lincoln with Ernest's brother, John, who was at school. John (senior) was working as a machine

fitter/erector. Ernest's mother was found at a house in Main Road, Bourne, listed as a housekeeper, the only other occupant was Alfred C Bratley age 67. Perhaps husband and wife both had temporary employment, or perhaps the marriage had broken down. The 1911 census might have clarified the situation, but this has not yet been found.

Ernest was also found in the 1901 census and was listed in a Royal Navy census return, as single and a member of the crew and stoker aboard HMS Victorious. In fact he had enlisted as a stoker on April 20<sup>th</sup>, 1898, aged 20, for a period of 12 years. He was 5' 3 ½" and recorded as having brown hair and brown eyes – *although*, *curiously*, *he was later recorded as blue-eyed!* 

His pre-war service was extensive and many ships and shore-based training establishments are listed. He was promoted to Stoker First Class on July 1<sup>st</sup>, 1906, while on board H.M.S. Revenge. He left the Royal Navy on April 19<sup>th</sup> 1910 with his character always recorded as '*Very Good*'.

At 31 he married Jessie Kate Keal in 1910 – she was about 10 years younger and was born in Great Carlton, Lincs. They moved into 22 Kent Street, off Monks Road, Lincoln, and he worked as a stationary engineer for a mineral water manufacturer. There were no children listed in the 1911 census, but later there was a daughter Elsie R S, born July 2<sup>nd</sup>, 1912.

On August 20<sup>th</sup>, 1914, he re-enlisted, or more likely was recalled from the Naval Reserve, for the duration of hostilities as a Stoker First Class, and after a short period was assigned to HMS Laertes on September 4<sup>th</sup>. It was probably during this period that his wife moved to Tetford to be with her parents.

HMS Laertes was a Laforey class destroyer built by Swan, Hunter & Wigham Richardson, Wallsend (later just Swan Hunter) and launched June 5<sup>th</sup>, 1913, under the name HMS Sarpedon, then subsequently renamed HMS Laertes on September 30<sup>th</sup>, 1913.

Before Ernest joined her she was part of the 3rd Destroyer Flotilla based at Harwich and took part in the Battle of Heligoland Bight where she was seriously damaged by four shell strikes and was dead in the water, but was saved and towed back to England for repair and that is when Ernest joined the crew.

HMS Laertes was then one of the destroyers which attempted to head off the attacking German ships during the 'Lowestoft Raid' – a planned short bombardment of Yarmouth and Lowestoft on April 25<sup>th</sup>, 1916. The German battlecruisers first fired on Lowestoft destroying 200 houses and two defensive gun batteries, injuring twelve people and killing three or four. The German ships then moved to Yarmouth, where they only managed to fire a few shells there before British ships arrived and engaged them. During this exchange HMS Laertes was severely damaged, with shellfire hitting the boiler room, and would probably have sunk, but for Ernest's actions.

He was incredibly brave and was very badly injured: "scalded from head to foot", and "such deep scalds were inflicted that after lingering for a fortnight in the Royal Naval Hospital, Shotley, the sufferer passed peacefully away." He died on May 10<sup>th</sup>, 1916, leaving Jessie a widow with a young child aged three. He was posthumously awarded the D.S.M. - a medal just two below a V.C.

One newspaper reported: "We understand from what details have reached us, that it was largely by the courage of the deceased (Ernest Clarke) that the ship reached port at all." . . . "The damage to the destroyer caused an immense escape of scalding steam, but with an admirable presence of mind and the full knowledge of the danger involved, Stoker Clark heroically dashed into the escaping steam and performed in the engine room an action which saved many lives."

The captain of the ship wrote personally to Ernest's widow and his mother with great sympathy and obviously thought highly of Ernest's action. "nothing I can say will really ease your heart of its burden. I can only offer you my most sincere sympathy, and assure you of any help it may be in my power to give. Believe me, yours sincerely M Lennon Goldsmith, Commander RN."

Incredibly his burial was controversial. Although his wife and daughter were living on the Ormsby Road – probably with her parents. The Rev William Wood, the Rector of St Mary's Church, refused permission for a Tetford burial on the grounds that he was not a native of the village. She must have been terribly distressed, but perhaps relieved when he was allowed to be buried at the church of St Olave just 2 ½ miles away in Ruckland on May 14<sup>th</sup>, 1916.

Unsurprisingly some people were angered and a week later a long anonymous letter was published in the local paper. The gist of the letter can be accurately inferred from the following excerpts:

"SIR, - May I through the medium of your paper voice the sentiments of disgust expressed by the parishioners of Tetford and its neighbourhood at the refusal of their Rector to bury the remains of one of our brave sailors in his churchyard"...."I wonder what will be the thoughts of that mother who proudly, gladly, gave her best - what was once a part of herself - at the call of our countries need! And what thoughts of that wife who held his hand and forced back the tears as she watched him depart!".... (signed) "A SAILOR'S FRIEND."

Certainly the Village was happy enough to commemorate him on the Tetford War Memorial later.

#### NATURE'S NOOK - from Paul Learoyd, CEO, Lincolnshire Wildlife Trust

Ocean, narrated by David Attenborough

What connects the North Sea washing up on the shores of Lincolnshire and the Southern Ocean around Antarctica?

Not a trick question, just a straightforward but rather amazing answer: the Atlantic Ocean, one of the five major interconnected oceans on our planet.

In his recently released film, Sir David Attenborough at 99 years old explores the planet's undersea habitats revealing both their beauty and the ways in which humans are depleting their riches.

Odeon (see their website <a href="https://www.odeon.co.uk/films/">https://www.odeon.co.uk/films/</a>) describes the film as "stunning, immersive cinematography [which] showcases the wonder of life under the seas." But never before-seen footage reveals the realities and challenges facing our oceans, from destructive fishing techniques to mass coral reef bleaching resulting from climate change.

Sir David warns that "we are almost out of time" but his key message is "not all is lost.... the ocean can bounce back to life....if left alone it may not just recover but thrive beyond anything anyone alive has ever seen".

You can watch Ocean with David Attenborough at most local cinemas.

Do stay on after the end credits roll to hear powerful first-hand accounts from the underwater camera team, their voices breaking with emotion as they describe what they witnessed. It will certainly make you think about what fish you eat and the other fish-derived products we use, such as fish meal and supplements.

#### **GROUP NEWS**

#### **TETFORD & DISTRICT W.I.** from Stephanie Wilkinson

Our animal loving members were treated to a really interesting presentation at the meeting on April 23rd. Ex RAF Kenneth Moore, a lively and engaging presenter, provided a fascinating insight into some extraordinary creatures who have aided and supported people in times of war and civil disaster, often in some quite amazing ways.

The PDSA Dickin Medal is the highest Award for Animals serving in military conflict. It is recognized worldwide as the animals' Victoria Cross. To date, the medal has been awarded to 38 dogs, 32 pigeons, 4 horses and 1 cat! Kenneth explained the creation of the award in 1943 by Maria Dickin CBE and illustrated with excellent visuals the astonishing stories of some of the animals recognised for their gallantry.

For example, Kuga the Belgian Malinois, part of the Special Air Service Regiment of the Australian Army, was awarded the medal for his 'unstinting bravery' in Afghanistan Rip, a stray mongrel, was decorated for locating many air raid victims during the 1940 London Blitz.

The extraordinary homing abilities of the humble pigeon are now not needed in this era of high tech communications, but their work carrying messages saved many lives in twentieth century conflicts.

Horses are of course another animal not deployed as widely in theatres of war these days, but many real life 'War Horses' served on hellish battlefields, their bravery earning them this medal.

Simon the ship's cat is the only feline who earned the Dickin Cross, posthumously sadly, for his brave ratcatching despite being wounded by a shell blast in the Yangtse Incident of WW2.

Members were moved by the stories of devotion, loyalty and love displayed by these beautiful animals and thanked Mr Moore for a most enlightening evening.

At the meeting a representative from Andy's Childrens' Hospice was presented with a cheque for £600 which was raised at the WI Coffee Morning on March 8<sup>th</sup>.

Our next meeting is on May 28th when we shall be discussing the WI 2025 Resolution and enjoying a bring and share supper.


#### **TETFORD WALKING GROUP** from Jonty Wild



Dial 999 for life-threatening emergencies. There is a doctor in the practice at least 4 days a week and extra cover is provided by the advanced nurse practitioners. The practice has a Care Coordinator, who in liaison with the hospital can help patients in need to access services such as Macmillan, physio, medication, and has links with the disability nurse. There is a Veteran's liaison and a digital liaison person.

**PRIVATE GP CLINIC** A new private practice is up and running in Louth, a 20 minute appointment is £120, any forward treatments can be continued privately or referred back to the NHS.

The **online** ordering system (mainly for blood or smear tests, ordering repeat prescriptions and viewing your medical record), is at <a href="https://systmonline.tpp-uk.com">https://systmonline.tpp-uk.com</a>.
You will need to register with the surgery before you can log into this online system.

<u>Also</u> there is an app – 'Airmid' – which "provides you with existing SystmOnline functionality plus lots more." You can log in with your SystmOnline username and password. However it has received very poor reviews with one reviewer judging it as "about as useful as a trap door in a canoe."

You can also download the NHS App which enables you to

- Order repeat prescriptions.
- Book nurse and health care assistant appointments.
- View medical records.
- Access test results and hospital letters.

The main difference between the **SystmOnline** and the **NHS App** is that the NHS App provides access to hospital letters.

The old separate Wolds **pharmacy** number **01507 535001** will now take you to the same options as the surgery number. The pharmacy is Option 3 but <u>the availability of the option to request repeat prescriptions over the phone is under review</u>. The pharmacy is open for collection of medicines from 9am to 2pm & 4pm to 6pm Monday or 9am – 6pm Tuesday -Friday. Controlled drugs must be collected before 5pm.

The ELMG website is at <a href="http://www.eastlindseymedicalgroup.co.uk/">http://www.eastlindseymedicalgroup.co.uk/</a>. The new 'total triage' system is accessed here. Search on 'East Lindsey Medical Group' and select 'Appointments' then you have various options including 'Use our online form' which takes you to 'Medical request/New condition' which takes you into the triage. Operates from 8am to 1pm.

Sinners is quite simply magnificent, and deserves to be seen in a cinema. The latest from director Ryan Coogler (Creed, Black Panther) is a horror-action-music-period piece about twin brothers (both Michael B. Jordan) returning to their home in Mississippi in 1932. It demonstrates what is occasionally great about Hollywood movie making. Concerned with many topics (music, race, the afterlife, vampires), it's separated into two halves to tell this epic story: buildup and drama; payoff and gore. I personally would argue that this film is made not just for horror fans, but then again, the tension and bloody violence of the third act is not for a weak stomach. A pretty perfect piece of entertainment in my eyes.

**Neil Young: Coastal** is an incredibly lovely documentary about one of my all-time favourite artists. Comprising a combination of iPhone footage and concert coverage, the film follows his first tour following lockdown.

The music is beautiful, and it's incredibly sweet, but my biggest takeaway from Daryl Hannah's latest (also Young's wife of many years) is just how funny Neil is! He's really a laugh-riot and can work a crowd with his off-the-cuff onstage comments. It was a pleasure to see this at the Kinema, and is certainly worth your time if you enjoy Neil Young's music and personality.

**Anatomy of a Fall** was recently added to Netflix and is a pretty great watch if you're looking for a unique legal drama/mystery. It took home the Oscar in 2024 for Best Original Screenplay, but the standout aspect is the complex performance from Sandra Hüller.

*Mission: Impossible* is one of (if not my number one) favourite film franchise, so I'm obviously very excited about *The Final Reckoning* which is just around the corner (screenings at the Kinema start May 19th). It may also be about time to give the most recent entry, *Dead Reckoning*, another visit. Or heck, any previous entry! The best action set-pieces you'll find in an English-Language movie.

Garden Story is my latest film! Presented in an abstract, non-sequential fashion, it tells the story of a filmmaker's growing frustration as he attempts to make a movie about his back garden. Mark, grinning, made a head-butting gesture.


"Tails you go with Susan."





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
