It was a great event with fabulous weather and has boosted our funds by £5500 to keep the ground and play park going for another year for everyone who uses it, including our cricket and football teams.

Special thanks to Mark, Graham and team for our tote (very well managed by Hazel) and Paul Todd for our safety fencing and help with the ground all year. Very special thanks to Ray from Tetford Country Cottages and Fishing Lakes for dealing with the traps and the terriers - we couldn't have done it without you. Our partners this year were Tetford and District WI and *The Times of Tetford and Salmonby* who gave their time and efforts for our charitable causes.

We are very grateful to all in the village who helped us behind the scenes and hope to see you all next year."

Furthermore: We have had our annual inspection and will be making some repairs to the fencing and topping up the bark under the swings so the funds raised will, as always, go straight back into maintaining the ground and equipment.

And here's an interesting footnote from Steve Sewell, North Road:

"I think that this is worth mentioning – I have been very impressed by the use that the young footballers have been making of the field over the summer, a lot more so than the cricketers!!! ($what\ DO\ you\ mean,\ Steve?-Ed$). The pitch markings have been particularly well done, very professional. It has been good to see the field being so well used."

THE SHORT MAT BOWLS CLUB season is now in full swing in the Hamilton Hall on Tuesday evenings, having started on the second of September.

FARM SHOP We note that the 'farm shop' in Lusby has closed suddenly. This farm shop started out life as a deli-type emporium, sorely needed locally, but that didn't last and it went downhill ending up as yet another greasy spoon, so it's no loss.

PARISH COUNCIL The Parish Council is still urgently seeking two more volunteer Councillors to fill the vacancies caused by resignations. There is a poster in the Parish Council section of this magazine. As we said before, far be it from this magazine to propose criteria for selection, but a couple of female councillors would address the current imbalance!

SALMONBY BENDS Repair work is scheduled for the week commencing 15th September. *The Times of Tetford & Salmonby* has no information as to the precise nature of what is planned, those curious to find out should contact their Parish Councillor or the County Highways Department. The roads to be closed are shown on this map as the darker heavy lines, with diversions the lighter heavy lines.



BUS SHELTER The Parish Council's application for a UKSPF GRASSroots grant to purchase a bus shelter for South Road has been rejected. The rejection includes the following reason: "Bus shelters have historically not been funded through this Scheme with the Panel generally taking the view that putting a shelter up will not make a difference to the frequency and availability of buses and will therefore not make a significant impact in getting people to utilise public transport." As one has come to expect, reasons like this for rejecting grant applications are patently painfully ludicrous. Who on earth ever thought that putting up a bus shelter would make a difference to the frequency and availability of buses? We lost that one years ago. But it would make a difference in getting people to utilise public transport. Waiting for a bus is one of the most soul-destroying miseries we in this country have to suffer – surely even the 'panel' must recognise this, and the fact that it's not always dry and sunny in this part of the world. We're supposed to be a civilised society and that includes not expecting people to stand outside in the wind and the rain when all they want to do is a bit of food shopping!! The shadowy grants 'panel', according to the blurb encouraging people to apply, have grants of "up to £24,999" to offer, but they seem to think that it is right, pompously prudent and expected of them not to dish out the dosh. How small-minded can you get? In our March 2022 Issue we carried an article about another grant source, Lincolnshire County Council's Bus Shelter Grant Scheme. The maximum grant in this scheme is £3000, which would cover Tetford's requirement. The publicity warns though that grants are issued on a first come first served basis at the start of each financial year, so we may be too late for 2025 and the Parish Council will have to go ahead and pay for the shelter out of their precept. The County Council also quote Scredington village near Sleaford as a case study who received such a grant, and now have a new bus shelter.

<u>HORNCASTLE</u> We have been circulated with a note from Isabel Forrester, a Trustee of the Horncastle Crisis Support Team & Community Larder Manager:-

HORNCASTLE CRISIS SUPPORT TEAM

The Support Team was set up as a formal charity during the pandemic, building on the informal small food bank that was already running from Horncastle's Community Centre. We now provide a range of support including food parcels which are delivered to the recipient's door and small grants for specific items to help people in our area with essential support.

We also have other initiatives, which have come about from discussions with professional providers, such as working with ELDC's Rough Sleeping team to ensure access to food and toiletries, clean socks and underwear, sleeping bags and other sources of warmth for those who are homeless. Social workers suggested a box containing the basics to set up a home, for those moving into accommodation with no possessions: this Home Starter Pack scheme has been successfully running for several years now. We have also worked alongside local schools, charities, businesses, social services and other organisations to ensure that families have the basics of life such as cooking facilities and beds. Our work is always backed by a professional referral to ensure that the recipient is getting all the support they require, from every angle and we continue to work quietly and as flexibly as possible to help our communities.

The Men on the Tetford War Memorial by Jonty Wild

Pte. 27852, Charles Edward Ernest Sentance, 3rd Bn., Sherwood Foresters (Notts

and Derby Regiment). Died 8/1/1917.

Charles was born in Eastville, Lincolnshire in 1898 and was the son of William and Sarah Eliza Sentance (née Maltby). He had two older siblings, including George who also appears on the memorial and two younger. All the family were Lincolnshire born and bred.

In 1901 the family were living in Eastville, Lincs where William was an ordinary agricultural worker, and by 1911 they had moved to New Leake, near Eastville where William was a garthman - a Lincolnshire term for a cattleman.

Dr Richard Harper-Smith, who wrote "Paupers, Priests and People of Tetford", believed that the family had a connection with Somersby, rather than a direct connection to Tetford and this has proved to be the case.

The family were probably living in Great Sturton in March 1915 and then moved to Somersby. The first documented connection being a newspaper report recording that William was fined 2s 6d for the poor school attendance of daughter, Edith. Charles' elder brother, George, died in 1918 while serving in the Royal Navy, the notification of that was sent to the family at Somereby (sic Somersby) Top, nr Spilsby Lincs.

Charles' enlisted at East Barkwith (near to Great Sturton) after one of the meetings held in villages that explained the need for war, the need to recruit and which criticised young men for not coming forward. He originally enlisted into the Lincolnshire Regiment and probably trained with them but later transferred to the 9th Battalion of the Notts and Derby Regiment as "Private 27852". Beyond this, little was certain until the discovery of a hospital admission entry, which was lucky because it was under an incorrect name. This confirmed that he must have been with the Notts and Derby Regiment, when they were ordered overseas in July 1915, sailing from Liverpool and bound for Gallipoli.

They landed at Suvla Bay on August 7th, 1915, under orders to attack and advance on Tekke Tepe Ridge. They were fortunate because this landing was virtually unopposed when thousands were slaughtered elsewhere in other landings, however, here there was a distinct lack of leadership. Lieutenant General Sir Frederick Stopford remained aboard one of the ships, meaning that he had no control over what was happening on the beach and that is where the soldiers stayed. General Sir Ian Standish Monteith Hamilton, who was overall commander, was said to be appalled when visiting Stopford, and discovered that nothing was being done to advance, and that the men on the beach were said "to be sitting around, still close to the beach". They were told to get on with it, but it was not until dawn on the 9th that British troops reached what was supposed to be in their hands 36 hours earlier.

Charles' Battalion suffered heavy casualties during the attack inland, probably much higher than if they had launched the attack immediately. Charles was with them, but not for long as his hospital admission entry recorded that he was admitted with "*Defective sight caused by shell*" on August 9th, 1915, and put on a trawler, bound for a hospital ship on the same day.

Charles experienced some of what was described in the various accounts written by comrades in the same Battalion.

Private Joseph Stenson wrote: "When we made the memorable landing at Suvla Bay we were packed like herrings on lighters. But, except for a few bullets whizzing and occasionally striking the boat, there was very little to get excited about. Directly after jumping ashore, we extended out with fixed bayonets, and the order was given for no man to fire. We advanced inland some distance, and I saw one poor chap shot clean through the head. We then dug ourselves in till morning and stopped there all the next day.

It was afterwards stated we should have taken possession of the hills where so many lives were lost. On Aug. 7th we advanced about a 1/4 of a mile with nothing doing, where we made a good trench and stayed there till next day. It was on Aug. 9th when the next advance took place at sunrise, and I shall never forget running the wire for our last place. We were being popped at, and three of us had lucky escapes. By this time seven officers were out of action, and we went on until we came to the "first aid" dressing station. I think if ever my heart was in my mouth it was that day. The moans of the men were awful, for many were burnt to death where the grass had caught fire."

Charles did not die until January 8th, 1917 – 17 months later, but his wounding at Gallipoli ends what we know with any certainty of his war experience. We do not know if he was treated and returned to Gallipoli to continue fighting or removed elsewhere for more extensive treatment, or even invalided home. After Gallipoli his Battalion moved to Imbros, then to Alexandria in Egypt, and then served in France from July 10th, 1916. We do not know if Charles was with them during any of this. We do know that he died in the Royal Infirmary in Sunderland in January 1917 and that his Death Certificate records the cause of death as Tuberculosis. It could have been contracted in Gallipoli or the trenches in France or anywhere in between, if the conditions were right. It was probably during treatment that he was transferred to the 3rd Battalion.

His next of kin were sent his Death Plaque and his medals. Later his parents William and Sarah, moved to Grange Cottage, Alford Rd., Mablethorpe, Lincs. In 1924 a pension record, bearing both sons' names, was addressed to their mother, at Somersby Cottage, Alexandra Park, High Street, Mablethorpe, so it appears that later, they moved there.

Gallipoli: The Gallipoli Campaign was a disaster. The British underestimated the Turkish and we gave away any chance of a surprise attack when British and French ships began a naval assault on the Dardanelles in February 1915. The one real 'success' was the deception enabling the evacuation of 105,000 men and 300 guns in late 1915 without a man being killed. Apparently, the Turks were still firing on the empty trenches some hours after the withdrawal was complete.

Tuberculosis: The problem of tuberculosis in the British Army was significant and was raised in the House of Commons in 1918, after it was known that in 1917 20,000 men had been invalided from the British Army through tuberculosis.

MARX AND BURGERS

My first meeting with Derek Le Page, publisher of *The Times of Tetford & Salmonby*, was by chance last month at the **Tetford Terrier Races**. I had arrived early for my stint on the barbecue station and decided to wander along the tented thoroughfare and see what was what and who was who.

In the event I did not make it past the first stall. A boyish face, lit with enthusiasm, greeted me and invited me to buy some raffle tickets. As soon as I learned he was the publisher of this chronicle I introduced myself as a two time contributor of poems. We fell into a stimulating conversation covering all sorts of subjects. I was so inspired by our meeting that, as I took my leave to head back to the burger stall, I spontaneously offered to write a new piece for the magazine. And, since this offer was coming out of that current exchange, we took two items of the moment; **Karl Marx**, who had been part of our conversation, and (**beef**) **burgers**, the cooking of which was the next item on my agenda. We combined them to make the title of my piece. Marx and burgers. With that I hurried off back to the barbecue.

Marx and burgers.... Marx and Burgers! What had I been thinking of??? For the next few days I could not believe what had possessed me to agree to such a title. How was I going to weave something from these oddest of bedfellows? Days passed. I was stuck. That is until, from deep within my unconscious mind, a word unbidden bubbled up. Burghers.

Burghers - the great and the good of the newly emerging towns of the Middle Ages. Burghers - the drivers of a new wealth in medieval Europe. Burghers - a new class breaking the mould of feudal society. Yes. It would be burghers not burgers! Marx was all about economic classes. With burghers I could do something....

So who were the burghers? They were the most successful of the townsfolk, those who rose to the top. In towns fortunes were made not by land ownership but by handiwork and business skill. Learn a trade and build a business; or become a merchant - buy, sell and make profit on the difference. A new economy was being created outside of the traditional landed interest. Towns and trade were the dynamo of this new economy and the burghers with their entrepreneurial spirit were at its beating heart.

From the 1200s onwards for 600 years the big history of Europe was church and christendom, wars and kings, exploration and trade, pamphlets and political thought. But all the while in the background the townsfolk, the burghers, were advancing, becoming the well-to-do. So much so that by the 1840s something never before seen was emerging - a middle class. From Edinburgh to Luxembourg, the burghers had become the bourgeoisie.

1848 and Karl Marx writes his Communist Manifesto. The burghers had become the bourgeoisie just in time to meet Karl Marx. Perhaps they would rather they hadn't... With the Manifesto Marx wanted to light a match and start a fire, a fire in ambition and society. Marx wanted to inspire a revolution.

But why, I hear you ask, was Marx so revolting?

It arises from the combination of his original view on the role of the philosopher and his equally unique perspective on history.

On the role of the philosopher he wrote "philosophers have only interpreted the world...The point however is to change it." This quote of his was considered so true to his life's work that it is inscribed on the pedestal of his tomb in Highgate Cemetery. Marx was an activist. Words and ideas were his weapons.

When it came to human history Marx was equally original. He took Hegel's idea of competing ideas and for the first time brought it down into human relations. He identified the hidden thread running through all of history as that of struggle between different classes within society. "Revolution is the locomotive of history." For Marx the most fundamental struggle was between oppressors and oppressed; the haves and the have-nots.

Once the burghers had been the new kids on the block. Now they were the bourgeoisie, part of the establishment. The revolution if it were to come would now be enacted by the havenots of town and countryside, the working class with their hammers and sickles. The privileges of the burghers had to go. Marx concluded his Communist Manifesto with a call to action. "Workers of the world unite. You have nothing to lose but your chains."

Success. I had done it. I had managed to write meaningfully about Marx and burgers, albeit with a trick of wordplay. I could now relax. But fate had one more twist in the tail for me. A second thought bubbled up from my unconscious, this time a realisation from memory. There had been no burgers that evening. No burgers! All we served that evening was pulled beef and Lincolnshire sausages! I had built this whole story on a false foundation.

Marx and burgers should never have been bedfellows. Indeed it is clear - Marx was always anti burgher. But then what should it have been? Pulled beef and Lincolnshire sausages... Bangers and Beef? Marx and Bangers and Beef. Yes. Bangers and beef are the currency of revolutionaries. If the "haves" resist the "have-nots" there will most definitely be a beef brewing between the two classes. And it will be a beef that requires all kinds of bangers: from guns to explosives. Bangers are the tool of revolution. Up the revolution. Marx and Bangers and Beef.

Epilogue

On the Tetford field that evening the bangers and beef quickly sold out and soon became just a distant memory. The event however continued long into the evening. In the soft golden light of the setting sun children played, neighbours chatted, and the last of the prizes were handed out. On days such as this it is clear why England never suffered a violent social revolution. The English way of village life is just too pleasant.

St Margaret's is Perpendicular in style; built by Albinus de Enderby who died in 1407. It contains an original rood screen, original oak door with Viking shield-boss nailed to it that was found in a field nearby, and an interesting font described in detail by Pevsner. There is also some medieval stained glass, some predating the church and considered rare, showing the coat of arms of Crowland Abbey. Alfred Lord Tennyson's father was rector here from 1806 until his death in 1831.

THE WOLDS BRANCH PPG

Extract from the Notes of the meeting held on Friday 9 September 2025

- 1. <u>Dispensary and Administration</u> To enable Dispensary to bring together all their services, it has been agreed to transfer the Dispensary to a larger area. The existing Care Navigation team will move to the smaller Dispensary area.
- 2. It is the intention to introduce **GP Assistants** to Tetford. A GP Assistant role provides support for clinical triage by filtering requests alongside the Triaging Clinician. The GP Assistants also offer an on the day service for urgent tests, for example blood tests and dermascopes. The GP Assistants are dual-trained in reception and health care assistant duties.
- 3. <u>Medication Reviews</u> The PPG was assured that the backlog is being reviewed to get the service back on track.
- 4. The <u>height, weight and blood pressure</u> monitoring machines are now ready for use. The infection, prevention and control processes have been signed off by the clinical team. The PPG opined that some people felt uncomfortable using the machine in the waiting room and it was confirmed that the machine would be screened off.
- 5. <u>NHS Portal</u> It was explained that there is a national drive to use the NHS App for sending patient appointments, although the NHS portal is being used by the local Hospitals. If patients do not want to use the NHS Portal, they can call the hospital and opt out of NHS Portal and choose a different form of communication.
- 6. <u>Hospital Appointments</u> It was noted that Hospital appointments are not always clear, and patients are sometimes getting appointment letters that do not indicate which speciality an appointment is with. If this is the case, patients are advised to contact the Hospital for clarity. Patients also found it frustrating that hospital records are not shared, but it was acknowledged that patient records are [still, alas?] specific to the care received from individual hospitals.
- 7. **Artificial Intelligence**: There was a discussion about the possibilities of AI being used by healthcare professionals. The PPG was advised that patients will always be asked for consent if consultations are to be recorded. A system call HEIDI, which is described as an ambient scribe, is being tested by one of the GPs at the Practice.
- 8. <u>COVID and FLU clinics</u>: Flu clinics are due to start in October with Care Homes being targeted first. There will be appointments on weekdays from October, and Saturday clinics have been set for:

Saturday 4 October 2025 Newmarket Saturday 25 October 2025 Tetford; Saturday 8 November 2025 Newmarket

It was noted that the COVID vaccination is only for the over 75s or clinically vulnerable. It was confirmed that, for those eligible, both vaccinations can be administered at the same time.

The next Tetford PPG meeting will be held on Friday 7 November from 2.00pm to 3.30pm at Tetford.

Dial 999 for life-threatening emergencies. There is a doctor in the practice at least 4 days a week and extra cover is provided by the advanced nurse practitioners. The practice has a Care Coordinator, who in liaison with the hospital can help patients in need to access services such as Macmillan, physio, medication, and has links with the disability nurse. There is a Veteran's liaison and a digital liaison person.

PRIVATE GP CLINIC A new private practice is up and running in Louth, a 20 minute appointment is £120, any forward treatments can be continued privately or referred back to the NHS.

The **online** ordering system (mainly for blood or smear tests, ordering repeat prescriptions and viewing your medical record), is at https://systmonline.tpp-uk.com.
You will need to register with the surgery before you can log into this online system.

<u>Also</u> there is an app – 'Airmid' – which "provides you with existing SystmOnline functionality plus lots more." You can log in with your SystmOnline username and password. However it has received very poor reviews with one reviewer judging it as "about as useful as a trap door in a canoe."

You can also download the NHS App which enables you to

- Order repeat prescriptions.
- Book nurse and health care assistant appointments.
- View medical records.
- Access test results and hospital letters.

The main difference between the **SystmOnline** and the **NHS App** is that the NHS App provides access to hospital letters.

The old separate Wolds **pharmacy** number **01507 535001** will now take you to the same options as the surgery number. The pharmacy is Option 3 but <u>the availability of the option to request repeat prescriptions over the phone is under review</u>. The pharmacy is open for collection of medicines from 9am to 2pm & 4pm to 6pm Monday or 9am – 6pm Tuesday -Friday. Controlled drugs must be collected before 5pm.

The ELMG website is at http://www.eastlindseymedicalgroup.nhs.uk/. The new 'total triage' system is accessed here. Search on 'East Lindsey Medical Group' and select 'Appointments' then you have various options including 'Use our online form' which takes you to 'Medical request/New condition' which takes you into the triage. FILM RUNDOWN by James Learoyd

Hello all! We've got some great releases to catch up on in this issue...

I'm in no way a comic book movie fan, and yet James Gunn's *Superman* entertained me. It's not an exceptional film, but I found myself surprised by how emotionally invested I became in a genre that I have little affinity for. And if you are a comic book fan, you're bound to love this vibrant and energetic take on America's most iconic hero.

The Naked Gun is the best and funniest comedy release of the decade so far. Studio comedies have recently hit a dry patch; but this remake of the classic Leslie Nielson cop spoof had me laughing constantly – and I even went back to see it again! Please go and watch it! (Playing at The Kinema in the Woods.)

I saw *Freaky Friday* (2003) for the first time in preparation for *Freakier Friday* and was moved to tears several times. In comparison, it's unfortunate that this body-swap sequel never hits that same level of emotional resonance. However, it's incredibly fun, and Lindsay Lohan's best performance in a minute. (Playing at The Kinema in the Woods.)

Weapons – I would argue – is the movie of the moment. In a year defined by its horror movies, this story of seventeen children who go missing – and the horrific deaths and supernatural occurrences taking place in a small town – is the supreme horror of the year. It's unusual in its plotting; told in overlapping, unchronological chapters and perspectives. But by the end, it gives you all the answers you need – and it's even more satisfying on an analytical rewatch.

One could argue that *The Life of Chuck* is more interesting than it is entertaining. Intelligent horror director Mike Flanagan here turns to more sentimental, "life-affirming" material from Stephen King. Told backwards, it tells the story of one man's life; but with the addition of some fantastical twists and turns. It leaves viewers with a warm feeling. (Playing at The Kinema in the Woods and Louth Playhouse Cinema.)

I was lucky enough to see an early critics' screening of *The Toxic Avenger* starring Peter Dinklage, while sat next to one of the baddies in the movie no less! This volatile guts and gore remake will not be for everyone – it's filled with violence and crude humour (I even watched the 'unrated' cut) – but I had a great time. (You can read my full review on UK Film Review.)

THE ELECTRIC FRYING PAN

'Connect' 10.05 service from Welwyn to Kings Cross pulled up at New Barnet station. I stood at the open door. It was February 2007, drizzling and cold. Where was Danny?!

Suddenly a small stout figure appeared from nowhere, bundling along the platform. Seeing me, he threw himself through the door, his plump face grinning widely. "Almost missed it!"

- "Where's your jacket?" I noticed spots of rain on his grey shirt.
- "I didn't have time to get it." Typical Danny, always late for school or his guitar lessons!
- "Aren't you cold?"
- "No," he said, shivering. Then, "Dad gave me some money." He brandished a couple of tenners.
- "You'll need it where we're going!"

Half an hour later we passed through the hallowed doors of *Harrods*, England's premier department store. There, for a month, was Born to Rock, an exhibition of electric guitars. We wandered past hundreds of instruments of every size and shape imaginable. Here, a handcrafted black guitar, sculpted into the shape of an alien. On sale at a cool eight and a half grand. There, a shabby, dented Stratocaster, nearly all the paint worn off, a survivor of countless gigs by the Irish blues legend, Rory Gallagher.

Guitars owned by members of the Who, the Rolling Stones and Led Zeppelin rubbed shoulders with modern instruments given hand-painted custom finishes - a hummingbird sipping at iridescent flowers, a lizard with a long outstretched blue tongue, a naked woman with huge breasts. "Don't look, Danny!" I said covering his eyes with my hands. We laughed.

Beyond the guitars lay an art exhibition by the Rolling Stones' Ronnie Wood; pencil drawings, multi-media prints, and oils.

"Is that an original?" I asked an attendant, admiring an impressive portrait of Bob Marley.

She smiled. "No, some of the drawings are original but the rest are limited edition prints. You can take photos if you want."

I busied myself taking pictures of everything, snapping lifelike images of Mick Jagger and Freddie Mercury amongst landscapes and still-lifes. Ronnie was no slouch when it came to art!

We returned to the guitar exhibition, now thinking it odd to see all those instruments displayed like dusty museum pieces, instead of in the hands of some outrageous 'rocker,' pounding out ear-splitting riffs.

Most of them weren't protected. When the security guards weren't looking you could reach out and strum the strings. Finally, we reached a glass case in a special enclosed area. A guard hovered nearby.

"What's this?" asked Danny.

I consulted an article in the catalogue. "It's the Electric Frying Pan. A prototype electrified Hawaiian guitar, designed by Georges Beauchamp in 1931. The world's first ever electric guitar!"

The fingerboard was in bad condition with missing and rusty frets, and the large silver pickup over the small round body was corroded.

"What d'you mean the first?" asked Danny, wide-eyed.

"The *first*. The one before the second! The one that started ... everything." I waved towards the maze of guitars beyond.

We stood, silently, gazing in awe.
