**CRICKET.** Tetford's final game of the season, on September 7<sup>th</sup> away to Grimsby Town CC resulted in a defeat for our local team. Tetford were all out for 153 whereas the hosts scored 223 for 9 wickets. Over the season Tetford won seven of their fourteen games, finishing fourth in a league of eight, which was topped by Grimoldby with ten wins and Grimsby with nine. Top Tetford batsmen were Jim Walters and Nick Paige, top bowlers were Nick Paige and Kai Stephenson while George Littleworth saw off nine victims in the field and from behind the stumps. **PARISH COUNCIL** The Parish Council is STILL urgently seeking two more volunteer Councillors to fill the vacancies caused by resignations. There is a poster in the Parish Council section of this magazine. As we have said several times before, far be it from this magazine to propose criteria for selection, but a couple of female councillors would address the current imbalance!

The **DOG TRAINING CENTRE** in Salmonby has been shut down, much to the relief of local residents.

**AUTUMN LITTER PICK** Thirteen litter pickers turned out over three days and picked, once more, a huge pile of litter (photo under *Parish Council*). Will people who litter never learn not to be so idiotic? Trevor Cawthorne, who organises the pick, reports "We covered all of the roads radiating out from Tetford. We reached the Skegness road at High Toynton, the top of Fulletby Hill, the top of Tetford Hill and the road to South Ormsby. Many thanks to everyone who took part." The next litter pick will be in April 2026.

BUS SHELTER A bus shelter has at last been installed in South Road, duly baptised by



the heaviest day's rain this year. It's taken more than a year and the Parish Council has not been helped to fund it by the local Council or grant-bestowing bodies. Credit goes to Judy Ebrey, without whose indomitable pressure it wouldn't have happened. The shelter has been purchased from the Parish Council's precept, but donations have already been received to supplement this, and more would be welcome — contact your local parish councillor. All we need now is another one outside the school!

SALMONBY BENDS Following the investigation by the County Council Highways Department on September 15<sup>th</sup>, the Bends had a visit from the JCB Pothole Pro, the Big Beast of potholing, on October 7<sup>th</sup>. Balfour Beatty had been contracted to fill half a dozen or so potholes with this machine, which is being given a year-long second chance by the County Council.



STEVE SEWELL wrote on October 3rd: "So much for the notices that went up in August announcing that 'Work will start w/c 15 September 2025'; as I have said before it would have made sense to do it during the 8/9/10 weeks of school summer holidays, as the designated diversion route will be far from satisfactory, particularly the run from Fulletby to Tetford! I have read somewhere about LCC Highways proposing to use a 'new' form of pothole repair on this scheme? This to me seems to imply that LCC are missing the point yet again, in that what this area actually needs in the first instance is a new drainage scheme! We will just have to wait and see!"

**EDWARD RICHARDSON EDUCATIONAL TRUST** During the last year only four candidates applied for and were awarded grants. A grant was also awarded to the school to help fund the new library.



#### NATURE'S NOOK - from Paul Learoyd, CEO, Lincolnshire Wildlife Trust

#### **Autumn in the Lincolnshire Wolds**

This autumn we are experiencing a mast year, not a reference to flying flags but our trees producing more nuts and berries than usual. The collective term for these nuts and berries is 'mast'. Some years we experience a great abundance; this is due to a number of factors including the weather.

A walk around the village, in woodland or along our hedgerows will reveal a stunning display of haws, sloughs, acorns, beech nuts and conkers. In our gardens it has been a bumper year for apples, but as any gardener knows there are many factors determining whether the crop comes good and it all starts with the flowers in spring.

Like your apple tree an oak has flowers in spring but more commonly these are wind pollinated, relying less on insects to transfer pollen for the fertilization process. The tree is monoecious with both male and female flowers on the same tree. The male flowers are in long greenish-yellow knobbly catkins releasing pollen. The female flowers are red and small, located on small stalks, peduncles which will eventually form the acorn if they survive early frosts, the nibbling of bullfinches or damage from heavy winds.

During a hot and dry summer like we have experienced, plants and animals respond. More light and less water triggers more berries and nuts to mature. This will be good for the many animals and birds which feed on this bumper harvest; look out for jays and the winter thrushes.

We can also expect a stunning display as leaves change colour. Despite the concern of an early fall of leaves, a false autumn, we are now seeing from the boost of summer sunshine a beautiful transition to autumnal colours.

Our grapevine has also had a bumper year with good bunches of black grapes ripening. This will be the first decent crop we have had. Any suggestions for uses of these pip filled pearls would be appreciated!

## The Men on the Tetford War Memorial by Jonty Wild Pte. 25630, Robert Knaggs, 7th Bn. North Staffordshire Regiment. Died 30/1/1917.

Robert was born in Scarborough, Yorkshire in 1894 and the first child of Robinson and Ada

Knaggs (née Barnes). Robert had 10 siblings, all younger, and the last 8 were all born in Lincolnshire. So by 1901 the family were certainly living in Langton where Robinson was working as a gamekeeper. Then by 1907 the family had moved to Brinkhill, near Alford and were still there, less Robert, in 1911. That census confirms that they had been married for 17 years and had eight children all surviving – two more were born later. Robert had left the family home and was boarding with the Chambers family in Sutterby, between Alford and Somersby, where he was working as a horseman on a farm. By 1921 his father was employed as a gamekeeper in Oxcombe.



On June 30th, 1915, Robert married Lucy Stanley in Tetford Church – believed to be Lucy Wattam Stanley whose birth was registered in Spilsby in 1891.

Although war was declared in August 1914, Robert did not enlist until December 11th, 1915, and he did so in Horncastle. Unusually his service records exist and record him as 23 years and 208 days old - later corrected to 22 years and 7 months - living with Lucy in Little Road, Tetford and working as a rabbit catcher.

When Robert enlisted, we know that Lucy was already pregnant because their son, Roland, was born in Tetford on July 30th, 1916. It is likely that he enlisted under 'The Derby Scheme', knowing that conscription was imminent and that this would mean that he could avoid being called to serve immediately. It allowed men to attest their willingness to serve but that they would only be mobilized based on need, age and marital status. So, although he had enlisted in December he was not mobilized until May 18<sup>th</sup>, 1916 and received a medical three days later. Then he was described as 5' 5 3/4" tall with a chest size of 36" (fully expanded) and weighed 137 pounds and his trade was recorded as 'engine driver' – possibly on a farm, but it is not clarified.

Robert was on 'Home' service from May 18th to October 13th, 1916. During that time he was in training and from May 18th, 1916 to the 26th was in Lincoln and on the 25th was recorded as in 'D' Coy. He was then in Wallsend and then Forest Hall, North Tyneside to October 13th – all of this was with the 3rd (Reserve) Battalion. He was transferred to 'C' Coy, 7th Battalion (same Regiment) on October 14th – probably at Devonport from where he embarked the following day and effectively joined the Mesopotamia Expeditionary Force (MEF). He then disembarked in Basra on November 22nd, joining his Battalion 'in the field' on December 26th.

Before Robert's time with them the 7th North Staffordshires had fought at Gallipoli before going to Egypt, and Mesopotamia, landing in February 1916 and by this time the British Army in Mesopotamia was in trouble. The British and Indian troops had pushed inland with good success and then overconfidence. Sickness and a general lack of munitions and supplies weakened the small British Force. After a 5-day battle at Ctesiphon with neither side gaining an overall advantage, the British retreated to Kut, with the Ottomans following and on December 7th the Siege of Kut began. In 1916, attempts by the British to break the siege failed and casualties were high for both sides and in a humiliating defeat the British

surrendered on April 29th. The British could not let the defeat stand. They reorganised, trained and improved supply lines and on December 13th, 1916, launched an offensive. So this was the background to Robert's arrival on December 26th, 1916. The Battalion were in trenches, and the War Diary records "Heavy rain impeded work. Noon - received orders to fill in all work done, preparatory to moving back on a new line. Owing to rain work was stopped altogether.", but they left the trenches on the 30<sup>th</sup>. So Robert probably joined them during the following period of rest and fatigue parties between January 1st and 6th, 1917.

On the 7th they moved back into the trenches, with the day-to-day tasks being working to improve trenches, sending out patrols and sniping. Some shelling continued until the 24<sup>th</sup> and casualties were low. An exception was an attack by the Turks on the night of the 11th which was driven off. The casualties during this event were 1 officer killed, and 2 others wounded. In the other ranks 17 were killed and 30 wounded. From the 21st they prepared to attack and on the 24th they rested.

On the 25th at 9:45am, after an intense British artillery bombardment, they attacked in waves. Robert was in 'C' Company, which was one of the attacking waves and furthest East. Bombers and Lewis Gunners followed the first wave, to help consolidate any success. The War Diary records the assault as "partially successful". The enemy counterattacked at 11am: "'A" Coy was practically isolated and partially driven back, and although the Battalion of the right flank of the North Staffs Regt. gave way, "B" & "C" Coys. held their ground for some considerable time, until the Royal Warwicks came up in support and the line was regained. From that time until 4pm, with only one officer, 2nd Lieut McDowell left, A, B and C Coys held what ground they could until overwhelmed by enemy bombers; they (with other battalions) finally evacuated the line and fell back to the position from which the assault had been delivered." So, no ground was gained. Casualties were recorded as 2 officers killed, 1 died of wounds, 4 wounded. In the ORs 55 killed, 163 wounded and 46 missing.

Robert was wounded in this attack, or while trying to withdraw, and was taken to No. 1 C. Field Ambulance, Mesopotamia and he died of his wounds there on January 30th, 1917. He was buried in the Amara War Cemetery. Amara is a town on the left bank of the Tigris some 520 kilometres from the sea. The War Cemetery is to the east of the town between the left bank of the river and the Chahaila Canal and holds 4,633 casualties.

He had served for 258 days: 149 training and on 'Home' Service, 109 with the Mesopotamia Expeditionary Force, of which only 69 were in Mesopotamia and of them only 35 'in the field'. He probably only went 'over the top' once, experienced one day of fighting and five days later he was dead, leaving a widow with a two-year old child.

His death was reported in the Lincolnshire Echo on February 28th, 1917. His possessions, a tobacco pouch, photograph and pocketbook were returned to his widow in June. Later, she received his pay owing, war gratuity and a pension of 18s and 9d a week, for herself and their child, and later still, his Death Plaque and scroll, then his medals - the British War and Victory medals.

Lucy remained in Tetford, and in 1921 was living in West Road where she lived in the home of Thomas Wattam, who is believed to be her grandfather and then remarried in January 1923, becoming Mrs Freeston.



But the wallet is mightier than the pen

#### **WAUGH AND PEAS** by Dominic Yeoman

Although this piece began on the flimsiest of punning pretexts, a throwaway line at the end of last month's Marx and Burgers, I have since been mining its at-first unsuspected significance.

Waugh's first novel, Decline and Fall, published in September 1928, was greeted with widespread acclaim, so much so that it marked the launch of his illustrious career. It was a success in marked contrast to the novel's title, and also to its passive and hapless anti-hero, a man of whom even Waugh, himself, wrote "the only interest about him arises from the unusual series of events of which his shadow was witness". He is, as lightweight as the pun which led me to the sequence of alliterative discoveries that I am impelled here to recount, and of which his unprepossessing initials constitute the first, Paul Pennyfeather.

Despite the triumph of Decline and Fall 1928 was to be a bittersweet year for Waugh. That summer, he entered his ill-fated marriage to Evelyn Gardner, daughter of Lord and Lady Burghclere. The wedding, at St Paul's, Portman Square, on June 27, was a quiet affair; in attendance were a mere three of Waugh's friends and, of the bride's but one, her longtime family friend, Pansy Pakenham.

Scarcely a year later the marriage was over. Evelyn (she) had found love in the arms of another. Evelyn (he) was distraught, and in at least partial consequence—and short order—converted to Roman Catholicism. No casual dalliance this, no rebound relationship, Waugh's faith would prove steadfast and deep. Religious themes would suffuse much of his later work, most particularly in the novel *Helena*, his personal favourite and the only one he cared to read aloud to his family. Within its pages Waugh recounts the search for the True Cross, that upon which Jesus was crucified, this most holy relic of Good Friday's perennial Passion.

Easter Sunday, 1966 fell on April 10th. That morning Waugh, as was his habit, attended Latin Mass. It would prove to be his final public act, for upon returning home he promptly and peacefully passed away. The man whose career had begun with Decline and Fall ended in a celebration of the Resurrection. His body was laid to rest in a plot of specially consecrated ground in the Combe Florey, Somerset churchyard of Saint Peter and Saint Paul.

A postscript—one further, and final, pertinent player to consider; a player more distant in time, yet pivotal: the alliterative triple that is *The Posthumous Papers of the Pickwick Club*. This, of course, is the 19-episode serialisation that launched the career of Charles Dickens and which, in 1837, was published as the novel, *The Pickwick Papers*. Dickens went on to be the golden goose of Chapman and Hall, the publishing house that held the rights to all his works, and where, in time, Waugh's father would become Managing Director. Almost a century later, when Evelyn Waugh's originally contracted publisher, Duckworth, declined to print Decline and Fall on grounds of obscenity, it was Chapman and Hall who stepped in to save the day, publishing his novel in Duckworth's stead. The *Posthumous Papers of the Pickwick Club* had opened a stream of wealth which cascaded down through Chapman and Hall over generations. It washed through Evelyn Waugh's childhood and, when most needed, it served as midwife to Waugh's literary career delivering Decline and Fall with its tale of the perambulations and perils of Paul Pennyfeather into the light of day. It is a possibility that without the Pickwick Club, Waugh's later works may never have been at all. One might even contend that the entirety of Waugh's work is by extension a body of Posthumous Pickwickian Papers. Next month I am minded to do exactly that. Possibly perhaps.

#### **READING GROUP** from Karen Watkins

September's read was *The Secret River* an historical novel set in 1806 in which William Thornhill, a waterman working on the River Thames, is convicted of theft and becomes one of the earliest criminals transported to New South Wales, Australia.

Themes include belonging, identity, colonisation and displacement, specifically the clash of cultures between the indigenous Aboriginal Australians and the colonisers.

The novel really divided the group and provoked some very emotional responses which made for a wide-ranging and interesting discussion about a particular point in history and one that many of us were coming to anew.

As with a previous book choice, *The Colour of Water*, it was interesting to think about how things had changed (or not) 200-plus years on - sadly, it seems entrenched inequality is still very evident today.

It's fair to stay the story challenged many of us, variously described as 'shocking', 'harrowing', 'a grim read', and 'deeply distressing', for others it was 'important to read it', 'provided fascinating detail', 'gripping' and 'memorable'.

My copy of the novel has an introduction by Diana Athill, literary editor, in which she comments on Grenville's research into the novel, and which addresses some of the issues raised in our discussion and helps explain some of those reader responses, Athill says:

"...her research brought Grenville face to face with the truth, and it was not just awkward. It was hideous. There are times when it takes a strong stomach to be involved in it alongside William and Sarah...the strength of her novel calls up sympathy, because once men on the far side of the planet had decided to colonise this land... it meant disregarding whoever happened to live there... the individuals being dumped became the situation's victims as much as those who were being dumped on..."

**PRIVATE GP CLINIC** A new private practice is up and running in Louth, a 20 minute appointment is £120, any forward treatments can be continued privately or referred back to the NHS.

The **online** ordering system (mainly for blood or smear tests, ordering repeat prescriptions and viewing your medical record), is at <a href="https://systmonline.tpp-uk.com">https://systmonline.tpp-uk.com</a>.
You will need to register with the surgery before you can log into this online system.

<u>Also</u> there is an app – 'Airmid' – which "provides you with existing SystmOnline functionality plus lots more." You can log in with your SystmOnline username and password. However it has received very poor reviews with one reviewer judging it as "about as useful as a trap door in a canoe."

You can also download the NHS App which enables you to

- Order repeat prescriptions.
- Book nurse and health care assistant appointments.
- View medical records.
- Access test results and hospital letters.

The main difference between the **SystmOnline** and the **NHS App** is that the NHS App provides access to hospital letters.

The old separate Wolds **pharmacy** number **01507 535001** will now take you to the same options as the surgery number. The pharmacy is Option 3 but <u>the availability of the option to request repeat prescriptions over the phone is under review</u>. The pharmacy is open for collection of medicines from 9am to 2pm & 4pm to 6pm Monday or 9am – 6pm Tuesday -Friday. Controlled drugs must be collected before 5pm.

#### **FILM RUNDOWN** by James Learoyd

Hello all! I hope everyone's keeping well and watching lots of movies.

Honey Don't! has received nothing but scathing reviews, but my friends and I enjoyed it fine. It's the second of Ethan Coen's lesbian detective B-movies (the first being Drive Away Dolls). It's evidently not for everyone; it's ridiculous, farcical and quite explicit. But, like the previous picture, what makes the film watchable is the no-nonsense performance by Margaret Qualley (daughter of Andie MacDowell).

Fun fact: *The Long Walk* is the third Stephen King adaptation of the year – the other two being *The Monkey* (an atrocious movie) and *The Life of Chuck* (a pretty interesting movie which was included in the last issue). Set in a not so distant-feeling dystopia, characters are forced to walk continuously in a life-or-death competition. If they slow under 3 mph, they're killed by the authoritarian forces. Many are finding a lot to love about this movie. The performances are impeccable across the board. But it's not for me, unfortunately. To me, it feels vicious and grim without much deeper resonance. Well-directed – but a real bummer.

One Battle After Another is the latest masterpiece from one of my favourite filmmakers, Paul Thomas Anderson. Anderson describes the plot as "what happens when revolutionaries collapse in on themselves". It's visually flawless, politically perceptive and unusually humorous. No other film is like this – particularly not one at such an epic budget. Not that it matters so much, but right now it seems to be the frontrunner for Best Picture at the Oscars. The best English-language film of the year so far. The cast includes DiCaprio, Sean Penn, Chase Infiniti and (the standout) Benicio del Toro. A recommendation for all.

*Highest 2 Lowest*, the new Spike Lee movie starring Denzel Washington, is now on Apple TV+. It's a highly entertaining remake of Akira Kurosawa's *High and Low* (1963) about a businessman confronted with a hostage situation. Like all of Lee's legendary work, he contextualises the plot through today's issues and concerns. Quite the audacious thriller.

I'd like to highlight a couple of Halloween-themed Kinema screenings on the horizon. Is there an 80s movie more perfect and more of its time than *Beetlejuice* (1988)? I doubt it. It'll be playing on the 25<sup>th</sup> and 30<sup>th</sup> of October. There's nothing better.

I'd also like to highlight 2005's *The Descent* which is playing on the 26<sup>th</sup> and 31<sup>st</sup> of October. I was one of the first to see the new 4K restoration of this raucous cave-set British horror at this year's Frightfest. The director and star were present and introduced the movie. It was a great time. But if you're already scared of caves, maybe don't watch this movie.

### NOTES FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL MEETING THAT TOOK PLACE ON SEPTEMBER 10<sup>TH</sup> 2025

Present: All 5 Parish Councillors, the Parish Clerk, County Councillor McGonigle, 4 MoPs.

- A MoP complained that texts from the pharmacy for repeat prescriptions were intermittently not received, something which the pharmacy blamed on a dodgy internet signal. An email to alert the PPG will be sent.
- The PC undertook to write to County Councillor McGonigle regarding the frequent flooding of West Road, thought to be caused by a damaged drainage system.
- The PC may apply to the County Council for a grant to cover the cost of the bus shelter. County Councillor McGonigle undertook to send the Clerk details of such grants. For now the PC will cover the cost. Donations towards the cost have been received from Mike Booth (£200) and Didi Riders & Drivers (£66.50). More donations would be welcome!
- Cllr. McGonigle announced that a "preliminary investigation" of Salmonby Bends would be carried out on September 15<sup>th</sup>, not a start to remedial works as had been anticipated. The Cllr. Undertook to update the PC after the investigation.
- A request for a 20mph speed limit outside the school had been rejected as "not meeting the criteria". The PC determined to request flashing speed signs.
- There had been no applicants to fill the vacancies on the PC
- Councillors agreed that their photos should be posted on the PC noticeboard, and to provide *The Times of Tetford & Salmonby* with their publishable contact details.
- Planning. The Council is to object to the re-purposed modular steel unit proposed for the Sawmill cottage in East Road.
- A MoP volunteered to carry out a footpath and bridleway survey requested by the County Council
- A MoP enquired as to who was responsible for the maintenance of the Dr Gray
   Memorial Garden as it was in an overgrown state. There was no answer available.

## NOTES FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL MEETING THAT TOOK PLACE ON OCTOBER 8<sup>TH</sup> 2025

Present: 4 Parish Councillors, the Parish Clerk, 5 MoPs.

- A MoP pointed out that the Parish Council noticeboard was largely way out of date. The noticeboard is due to be replaced and it was requested that the new one should be lower indeed *TTOTAS* has always recommended the use of a stepladder.
- The admin demanded by the paperwork for the County Council footpath and bridleway survey has proved onerous, so the offer from the MoP to perform the

survey was withdrawn. The general public is asked instead to report any defects to the Parish Council.

- Ongoing are the District Councillor's negotiations with the Platform Housing Group, who look after social housing in the area and are also responsible for the land on which the Little London postbox currently resides.
- A MoP highlighted a problem of flytipping builders' waste in Black Hill, commonly known as Green Lane off the Salmonby Road. Now cleared.
- Lincoln County Highways Dept have maintained that there is nothing wrong with the drainage system in West Road. Residents are therefore urged to send photos of flooding to County Councillor McGonigle at <a href="mailto:cllra.mcgonigle@lincolnshire.gov.uk">cllra.mcgonigle@lincolnshire.gov.uk</a> and to FixMyStreet <a href="mailto:https://www.fixmystreet.com/">https://www.fixmystreet.com/</a>
- Winter salt is due to be delivered to the village hall, for use by residents on icy pavements and roads
- A resident has written in complaining about the lack of notice (i.e.none) given of the recent (Tuesday 7<sup>th</sup> Oct) pothole-filling in Salmonby Bends and concomitant road closure, not to mention that considerably more than filling a few potholes is needed in order to repair the road. (It should also be noted, though this was not covered in the meeting, that very large vehicles are gradually eroding the banks and thus widening the road in this vicinity, plus using residents' driveways as passing places.)

#### East Ravendale - Gunnerby by Simon Wood

Distance approx. 4.5 miles, time approx. 2 hours (45 mins. optional extensions). Total ascent 70 metres. Road, bridleway. Walking boots are recommended. Two churches.

Our October walk explores a quiet area of the northern Lincolnshire Wolds. Two-thirds of the route is road walking, but the roads are of the minor variety, with very little traffic (one even has two cattle grids). Best walked on a sunny day, but walkable in all weathers, although the cross-country bit, C-F, would need walking boots if wet, as it is a designated bridlepath.



The starting point,

**A**, is reached most simply from Tetford by taking the A16 through Louth and turning off onto the A18, Barton Street, before or after Ludborough. At Ashby Hill, turn left to East Ravendale, then take the first right turn to Hatcliffe. This road is named The Avenue and comprises a section of The Wanderlust Way, a twenty-mile long distance footpath.

There is not a lot of parking space along this narrow country road, but at **A**, there is the first of two cattle grids, and plenty of space for two or three cars to park. Leaving your vehicle, you now head along the road through a lovely wooded valley, rather like a mini Hubbard's Hills. At **B**, you take the road to the left, shortly passing the imposing edifice of Hatcliffe Manor. An optional extension would be to visit the village of Hatcliffe and the church of St Mary, **G**. The author did not, in fact, visit it owing to time constraints, so wasn't able to ascertain whether it is normally open or not. Call 01472 753602 for further information.

Heading along the Gunnerby Road takes you past the modernistic Barrow House on your right, then a power transmission station, Gunnerby Farm, and Gunnerby House. Look out for the Bridleway sign on your left, **C**, and walk to **D**, where you turn along the top of a huge field. The hedges are high with a multitude of berries and suchlike. Those 'in the know' are sure to find something of interest in the hedgerows. The turn at **E** is signed with a blue arrow against a circular yellow background on a post. There is an opportunity to get lost a little further on (about where it says 'sheep dip' on the map) as the sign to the left is obscured by a row of large hay rolls. Nevertheless, turn left here and take comfort as you walk under the transmission line that you are on the correct route.

At **F**, turn left as per the signpost, and follow it to the road, passing over a brook via a small wooden bridge. Facing you, as you step back onto the road, is a new house, freshly constructed over the summer. You are now back on the Wanderlust Way. Turn left, and shortly you pass the first of four entrances to a chalk cliff, **I**, forming part of an old quarry, on your right. Two of them say, "Keep out. Falling Rocks," the other two don't. A high chalk cliff runs alongside the road, behind a narrow bit of woodland for perhaps a quarter of a mile. Certainly, an interesting and uncommon feature. Head back to your vehicle at **A** after perusing the cliffs as you see fit.

You may care to visit St Martin's Church at East Ravendale, **H**. Head back along The Avenue and over the crossroads (where you turned right originally). This road is a continuation of The Avenue, and there is some parking space on the verge by the church. Phone 01472 822172 for opening information.

Heading back towards Ashby Hill, you can turn right to return home on the A18, or continue straight over to head into Waltham. There are several tea rooms in Waltham, as well as The Kings Head and The Tilted Barrel pubs, plus shops and takeaways, as well as the famous Waltham Windmill with numerous attractions. At the time of writing, the windmill is temporarily closed as substantial restoration has been undertaken over the last twelve months or so. It seems it will be open again shortly, judging from the information on their website.

Alternatively, you can recover from your exertions at the imposing Landmark Café and Restaurant, about three-quarters of a mile to your left, along the A18 from Ashby Hill. It is new, so not shown on the map above.
