

**TETFORD ST MARY'S BELLS – a bit of back history.** From Marlene Renshaw.

In 2002/3 the three original bells in St Mary's were removed and refurbished (*see photographic display in the church*). The cost of this work was quoted at £6969.00 plus joinery works at £795, and included automating the ringing. It was initially hoped that this would not be subject to VAT. In the event Eayre & Smith, the contractors, did the joinery work at a reduced rate but St. Mary's did have to pay the VAT.

The launch on November 30<sup>th</sup> 2001 of Richard Harper-Smith's book 'Paupers, Priests and People' raised over £2000 for the Bell Fund, with publication costs covered by Dr and Mrs Harper-Smith. The publication was followed by a series of illustrated talks by Dr. Harper-Smith on the history of Tetford and Salmonby and, with further book sales, by September 2002 the total raised was £4566. The remainder of the cost was met by individual donations supplemented by St Mary's accounts and the Fabric Fund.

# Modular Building Project Impacted by a Withdrawal of Support

We're writing with an update on our modular building project (for our Wellbeing Hub), although it is not the news we had hoped to share. In our previous press release, we explained that MHD Construction, Mablethorpe, had offered to complete the groundwork at no cost to the school, which would have allowed us to progress swiftly with the next stage of the project.

Despite repeated attempts to confirm arrangements, we have not been able to secure a definite start date from the company, and it now appears that the original offer is unlikely to proceed. As a result, we currently do not have an alternative provider in place to complete the groundwork.

This leaves us in a difficult position. While the funding for the building itself remains fully secured thanks to the incredibly generous support from both NFU Mutual and our own PSFA, the cost of the groundwork was not something we had anticipated needing to cover.

Unfortunately, this means our modular building will not be ready by the New Year as previously anticipated, and the revised timescale is uncertain at this stage.

We are exploring every possible option to move the project forward and remain hopeful that a solution can be found, though we are unable to make any firm commitments just yet.

# NATURE'S NOOK - from Paul Learoyd, CEO, Lincolnshire Wildlife Trust

# December 2025

Christmas can be a very busy time of year. If you are looking for a distraction and something simpler why not step outside and enjoy nature.

Around the village the rooks are already busy, and the rookery is noisy with activity. Another rookery not so far away is Donna Nook with its grey seal rookery. A seal rookery is where females congregate to give birth. At Donna Nook numbers of pups born appear to have revived from last years' drop, we are still waiting for the final figures as it has been known for a late seal to give birth on Christmas day. While numbers to be seen are starting to drop it is still a sight to behold throughout this festive period.

Winter is not renowned for its dawn chorus, which is a shame as it is much easier to get up at first light when sunrise is not until 8:00am, but it is worth standing and listening. My garden last Christmas was quite aptly filled with the song calls of robins, at least four birds were competing for attention. Great spotted woodpecker drumming and tawny owl hooting all add to a winter chorus.

There are some flowers and plants at their best at this time of year too. Mistletoe with its white berries, yellow flowers of aconite and primrose or prima rosa, the first rose of the year, will all make an appearance over the next few weeks. The daisies which have only just gone over, as a result of our false autumn, will be back in late January. The Botanical Society of Britain and Ireland (BSBI) have a New Year Plant hunt, seeking to record wild plants in flower. For more information go to their website.

Ernest was born in Tetford, in 1899 and one of eight children of George and Mary Ann Lancaster (née Colvill). His parents were both born in Lincolnshire, Mary in Tetford.

The birth locations for the children suggest that the family were living in Driby in 1883, then Legbourne by 1885. They moved to Aby by 1890 and then Tetford by 1899.

Of the sons, we know that Ernest, William and Herbert all served in the Great War and only Herbert survived. George Brooker, their sister Grace's husband was also killed.

In 1901, the family were living in Ormsby Road, with Ernest's father working as a market gardener and licensed hawker. They were still in Tetford in 1911, when Ernest (11) was at school.

Frustratingly, there is now a gap between 1911 and a few weeks before Ernest's death in October 1917, which is difficult to fill with any accuracy. This is another case for the Tetford men of when a service record might reveal so much, and another when it is just not available. Unless more information is found, all we can try to do is make educated guesses.

He is recorded as enlisting in Horncastle while living in Tetford, but we do not know when. The medals he received confirm that he did not go overseas earlier than 1916. His orginal service number was 5047 - suggesting he was either serving in a pre-war Territorial battalion or a long serving soldier - but Ernest would only have been about 14 so neither obviously fits. Seventeen was the minimum to age enlist and 19 to serve abroad, and after conscription started in 1916 the minimum age was 18. Given Ernest's young age, he probably served from some time in 1917, but we should also remember that many young men and boys lied about their age. My best guess is that he volunteered and did not wait for conscription, that his training began in late 1916 or early 1917 and potentially was cut short to replace the Army losses during the Battle of Arras or the Third Battle of Ypres. We must rely on his Battalion's War Diary to establish his likely experience of war, but when do we start? His mother died on July 2<sup>nd</sup>, 1917 and the family believe Ernest attended the funeral and if so he would not have gone overseas until after then.

In August 1917 the 1st Lincolns were billeted in Danville (France) and on the 31st a draft of 78 ORs arrived, possibly Ernest Lancaster was one of them. If so, he had an easy start, with drill, training, football, cricket and other competitions until the 14th. More ominously on the 15th they were practising an attack, including the use of blank ammunition by the 10th Yorkshire Regiment, as they took on the role of the Germans.

On September 16th, 1917, at 2pm they marched from Dainville Wood to Aubigny, about 10 miles, where they entrained for Cassell, arriving there at about 1:40am, and then marched to Borre, before resting for the remainder of that day. On the 18th and 19th they were instructed on attack,

counterattack, meeting counterattack and consolidation. On the 20th they moved by lorry to a camp near Ridgewood - south-east of Etang de Dickebusch (Belgium) - arriving at 3:30pm. There was no rest for 'A' and 'B' Companies as they commenced digging 2000 yards of cable trench and only finished at about 5am. Then, an hour and a half later, 'C' and 'D' Companies marched out to continue the work. During this time one man was killed and 8 wounded when they were shelled.

The Germans suspected that something was about to happen and tried to interfere with preparations. The Battalion either rested or performed fatigue duties until the 25th and then marched to a new camp near Berthen (France) for more training and bathed at Le Besace Farm, before moving three more times before October 1<sup>st</sup>. Then finally to Polygon Wood on the 3rd where they dug in.

The following day they entered The Battle of Broodseinde – part of the Third Battle of Ypres. For this they used the 'bite-and-hold tactics' much favoured by General Herbert Plumer. The strategy was to attack and take only the ground that you were confident you could hold against a counterattack, consolidate, regroup and be ready to go again, when circumstances were right.

"The attack took place at 6am on the 4th of October and was directed against the main line of the ridge east of Zonnebeke. . . . . Two battalions of the regiment - the 1st and 8th Lincolnshire - took part in the Battle of Broodseinde, the former attacking the enemy near the south-western corner of Polygon Wood, the latter south of the Menin road."

This battle was the most successful of the Allied attacks of the Third Battle of Ypres, with the British devastating the German defence. This mattered little to Ernest as he was killed. The War Diary recorded estimated casualties as 24 men killed, 167 wounded and 36 men missing.

If we guessed correctly and he only joined the Battalion in August, he experienced something less than 24-hours of fighting. Local newspapers reported that Ernest was a stretcherbearer, if so, he probably didn't fire a shot at the enemy and was probably killed by shell or by general gunfire.

His family were notified in a letter sent by his Captain soon after his death: "Dear Mr Lancaster, I sincerely regret to have to inform you that your son was killed in action 4th inst. during the big and most successful attack on the enemy's positions on that day. He had just carried a number of wounded safely through a heavy barrage of shell fire, and was returning through the same barrage when he was killed instantaneously by a shell. I can hardly express the sympathy I feel for you in your great loss; your son was brave and modest, and was loved by all. I had known him many months; he was always most anxious to do what he considered to be his duty, and although so young he did it splendidly. He will be greatly missed in the Battalion where he was a universal favourite. I know I am expressing the sentiments of the Battalion, when I offer you my deepest sympathy in your irreparable loss."

Although not the case with many, Ernest's body was found, recovered, and he was buried in Hooge Crater Cemetery (photo of the cemetery available).

It was recorded that his father never got over Ernest's and his brother Willie's death and spent much of his later years at the Tetford War Memorial, but he had moved to Horncastle by 1939.

# Lord Hurcomb by Neil Parnham

It didn't seem possible to me at the time,
That they could possibly shut the East Lincolnshire Line,
We'ed watch the trains pass by; the Expresses, the Iron Ore and the Fish
How could anyone possibly bring an end to this?

In 1963 I was an 'ode schoolboy, and an avid train-spotter,
At collecting steam engine numbers, cabbing them, there was nobody 'otter.
In the school holidays with a rail Roving Pass in hand,
I'd start out from Mablethorpe and tour the rails of Lincolnshire's lands.

You would hardly recognise the stations now, Ripped up, grown over and the tracks under plough. Beautifully kept stations like Firsby, Alford and Withcall, That served their townsfolk, the RAF, the tourists and all.

I'd spend many days at Aby with a signalman I knew well, Many a tale of railways he'd sit down and tell. Under his careful watch, the heavy signals I'd peg, Which suited him well as he had a real gammy leg!

I'd be up and down the steps to open the crossing gates, Then down again soon after, to close them for a fast freight. A code 3-1-1 block bell would ring and tell, That a Grimsby Fish Train was on line and was going like 'ell.

By heck they'd rattle the box when they came through, A 9F with a hundred waggons behind and that's true. Them fillets would be in Kings Cross in 2 hours time, Just so long as the signalmen on the way cleared the line!

One day I was in for real treat,

For destined was I for Lord Hurcomb to meet!

Not the old Minister of Transport you understand,

But the Britannia Class loco number 1, green, clean and grand.

For phone rang at Aby, it was Authorpe with information providing, Signalman said, "I have just shunted Lord Hurcomb into my siding!" If that 'ode boy of y'ourn gets on his bike then maybe, He will get a ride back up in the engine cab to Aby?

I was off like a shot, I've never pedalled so fast,
I skidded into Authorpe yard shouting" I'm 'ere with a gasp!
There it stood in the siding, simmering, a sight to behold,
The driver smiled down and beckoned me up, I didn't need to be told!

"Set thee bike there lad, (Driver were a Yorkie!) agin yon bunker",

"Nah move it upards a bit to let some steam in",
"Not ower much mind or you'll make t'wheels spin"
We joined the main line and a bit faster he let me go,
But in no time at all the Distant for Aby said to slow.

Down I jumped at Aby old platform with a ruddy great grin,
Nearly forgetting me bike, the cab was it still in.
I thanked him and thanked him the best I ever could,
Knowing that, to have a chance like this again, I never would.

Those days are gone now, that era too has gone,
Ode boys today will never know what we'ed seen and done.
But I have my memories of those days of steam and rail,
And I'm pleased to be able to re-tell this tale.



No. 70001 'Lord Hurcomb' was constructed at Crewe Works in February 1951 and bore the name of Cyril Hurcomb who oversaw the Ministry of War Transport. It was constructed to Order No. E479/220 and completed on 14th February that year.

From Stratford shed, 70001 hauled passenger express trains on the Great Eastern Railway such as 'The Norfolkman'. For over twelve years, the locomotive was in service on the GE section. In 1954, the total mileage was 78,600.

The locomotive was withdrawn from service on 3rd September 1966 and stored at Carlisle Kingmoor Shed (12A) until the end of the year. In January 1967, 70001 was cut up at Motherwell Machinery and Scrap Co in Wishaw, Scotland.

# **READING GROUP ROUND-UP 2025** from Karen Watkins

We have had an interesting and diverse reading list this year, an excellent mix of genres and authors with books from the 1920s to the 2020s; all have provoked great discussion and have taken us all over the world within the informal, friendly environment of our reading group.

As we finalise the 2026 calendar, here's a round-up of the books we read and the places and times they took us to in 2025:

In January we were in rural Ireland in the 1980s with the 'small but perfectly formed' novella, *Small Things Like These*, and the secrecy surrounding the 'Magdalene Laundries'; in March we travelled back a few decades to post-war London and the early days of the NHS for *The Dark Circle*, the story of a brother and sister receiving treatment in a TB sanatorium (more uplifting and entertaining than it sounds!).

In May were in Brooklyn, New York, for a moving account of a black man's experiences of being raised by a white, Jewish mother in the autobiography *The Color of Water*, exploring themes of racial identity, religion and family; in sharp contrast, August saw us immersed in the English countryside and a woman's unique, and beautifully-written, experience of the Covid lock-downs in the memoir *Raising Hare*, so much more than just a 'nature book'.

18<sup>th</sup> century Australia, and its brutal colonisation, was the backdrop for September's choice, *The Secret River*, and for our final novel, *An Enchanted April*, we joined four genteel ladies, drawn by 'wisteria and sunshine' to a villa in Portofino in 1922 – a real change of pace and a lovely read in the midst of a cold, wet English November.

In December we will meet for our traditional Christmas get-together when, fortified by festive food and drink, the group will share their book recommendations on the theme 'A Journey' – it will be interesting to see where these will take us and what we might discover along the way... Our first meeting of the new year is on Friday 30<sup>th</sup> January.

The one that's been rejected more times than I care to think about. But hey! What about Stephen King, Agatha Christie, and J K Rowling?

Finally, it's finished. 11.30 p.m., half an hour before 'witching hour.' How pleased I am to sit 'in here', writing, rather than 'out there,' getting 'wrecked' and singing *Auld Lang Syne* with strangers!



Wake Up Dead Man: The third contribution to the Knives Out series, director Rian Johnson is again incredibly on the pulse by focusing on themes of religion, politics, and fanatical behaviour. Some have even said this is the best of the three, with a stand-out performance from Josh O'Connor as an exboxer turned priest. Lots of fun, lots of mystery, and available to watch at the Kinema in the Woods, Louth Playhouse or on Netflix (from 12th December).

**Bad Apples:** Though I can't find commercial release information for this film yet, Bad Apples is absolutely one to watch out for. Starring Saoirse Ronan as an overworked teacher struggling with a disruptive student, the film takes us to darkly comedic places and is enrapturing at every moment.

Home Alone: It's that time of year again, and I for one can't wait to rewatch Home Alone! A deceptively well-structured film for what seems like a simple, entertaining kids' film. Look out for certain details, such as Kevin's boarding pass being accidentally thrown in the bin during the pizza clean-up, and you'll realise why it works so well. (Available on **Disney+**.)

The surgery is part of the East Lindsey Medical Group (ELMG), Newmarket, Louth Tel. **01507 603121** (**Option 1** Automated system to book, set or cancel appointments/order repeat prescriptions **Option 2** Care Navigation Team **Option 3** Pharmacy/Prescriptions 9am to 1pm and 2pm to 4pm). Dial 999 for life-threatening emergencies. There is a doctor in the practice at least 4 days a week and extra cover is provided by the advanced nurse practitioners. The practice has a Care Coordinator, who in liaison with the hospital can help patients in need to access services such as Macmillan, physio, medication, and has links with the disability nurse. There is a Veteran's liaison and a digital liaison person.

**PRIVATE GP CLINIC** A new private practice is up and running in Louth, a 20 minute appointment is £120, any forward treatments can be continued privately or referred back to the NHS.

The **online** ordering system (mainly for blood or smear tests, ordering repeat prescriptions and viewing your medical record), is at <a href="https://systmonline.tpp-uk.com">https://systmonline.tpp-uk.com</a>.
You will need to register with the surgery before you can log into this online system.

<u>Also</u> there is an app – 'Airmid' – which "provides you with existing SystmOnline functionality plus lots more." You can log in with your SystmOnline username and password. However it has received very poor reviews with one reviewer judging it as "about as useful as a trap door in a canoe."

You can also download the NHS App which enables you to

- Order repeat prescriptions.
- Book nurse and health care assistant appointments.
- View medical records.
- Access test results and hospital letters.

The main difference between the **SystmOnline** and the **NHS App** is that the NHS App provides access to hospital letters.

The old separate Wolds **pharmacy** number **01507 535001** will now take you to the same options as the surgery number. The pharmacy is Option 3 but <u>the availability of the option to request repeat prescriptions over the phone is under review</u>. The pharmacy is open for collection of medicines from 9am to 2pm & 4pm to 6pm Monday or 9am – 6pm Tuesday -Friday. Controlled drugs must be collected before 5pm.

The ELMG website is at <a href="http://www.eastlindseymedicalgroup.nhs.uk/">http://www.eastlindseymedicalgroup.nhs.uk/</a>. The new 'total triage' system is accessed here. Search on 'East Lindsey Medical Group' and select 'Appointments' then you have various options including 'Use our online form' which takes you to 'Medical request/New condition' which takes you into the triage. Operates from 8am to 1pm (hours due to be extended) Monday to Friday.

# NOTES FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL MEETING THAT TOOK PLACE ON NOVEMBER 20<sup>TH</sup> 2025

Present: All 5 Parish Councillors, the Parish Clerk, District Councillor Simpson, 2 MoPs.

- A MoP reported an ongoing incidence of light pollution. The Parish Council Chair undertook to investigate whether and how the issue could be ameliorated.
- District Councillor Simpson reported that there were funds left in his discretionary allocation. Several uses for this were posited (1) treat the War Memorial steps against slipperiness (b) further maintenance of the village hall car park (c)replace the Parish Council noticeboard (d)mend the broken bollard in the village hall car park (d. fund this magazine? Ed.)
- It was noted that the salt for use by residents in Winter had been delivered into the village hall car park. Councillor Hazel warned against residents using this in public places for danger of liability in case of consequential accident.
- The (fairly) recently relocated postbox now in Little London may be moved again. A
  councillor suggested that when or if this happens maybe it could be replaced by a
  free-standing cylindrical post box (would complement the red telephone kiosk).
- District Councillor Simpson reported that the Local Government reform proposal
  would be submitted in the next week, leading perhaps to a 50% reduction in the
  number of councillors from over 400 to about 200 (at least initially!). In 2027 council
  elections will be as now, in 2028 a mixture of old and new council structure, and in
  2029 completely new.
- Planning applications are rarely submitted to the full planning committee but processed by the chief planning officer. This is likely to become even more the case, slowing the process even more.
- Planning. An application is due to be made for an extension to a house in Salmonby.
   The meeting was alerted to this as the opportunity for submission of comments was likely to be obscured by the festive season.
- A resident raised the subject of the elderly and disabled at Christmas. The clerk to the council volunteered to field requests for assistance in, for example, collecting medication, shopping etc.
- It seems that more builders' rubble has mysteriously appeared in Green Lane.
- West Road has flooded soon after the drains were cleared by the County Council.
- The site maintenance history for the Salmonby Bends over the last 5 years runs into 34 pages(!)

# Walesby-Claxby-Normanby le Wold Walk by Simon Wood

Distance approx. 4.75 miles, time approx. 2½ -2½ hours. Total ascent 152 metres. Road, bridleway, footpath, farm track. Walking boots essential. Three churches.

Our final walk of 2025 explores the highest area of the Lincolnshire Wolds and requires a degree of walking experience and stamina. However, as long as you can walk up Tetford Hill, you should have few problems.

The starting point, **A**, is reached most simply from Tetford by taking the Caistor High Street (via Belchford and Hemingby) and turning down Walesby Hill north of the Tealby-Kirmond le Mire crossroads ("Jim's Yard"). Alternatively, take the Bluestone Heath Road to the A157, turn left, then right at the crossroads with Caistor High Street, then as above. Either way, about a 30-35-minute drive. At the bottom of Walesby Hill, follow the road to the left and immediately turn right onto Moor Road. In front of you, you will see a long building of brown stone on the right, with about four car parking spaces. In the author's experience, there isn't a huge



amount of car parking space in Walesby, so in the event all the spaces are taken, one option is to continue along Moor Road, where there is parking on the right-hand side between groups of trees.

From the long building mentioned above, you will walk a short distance to a track on the right and the Viking Way sign. Being Viking Way territory, there is ample signage of all footpaths and bridleways hereabouts, and the little Viking helmet sign indicates the official path.

Follow the track, being sure to follow it to the left at **B**. At **C**, you will take the public byway to the left to follow the edge of Claxby Wood. This is an unkempt wood of young trees, with much undergrowth and an impenetrable barrier of bramble, except where there are entrances (with warning signs) for shooting activities. So, not worth bothering with. Just before you turn off the wood towards **D**, at the time of writing, there is a fallen tree right across the track. It is surprisingly obstructive, but the author discovered that the right-hand side had less substantial branches, and it was possible to push underneath to continue on to **D**. Phew! At **D**, you now follow a metalled road to Park Road, and then on to the bend at **E**. Here, the author was surprised to find a permitted footpath not on the OS map! Go through the gate, then follow the edge of the field to the right at the other side and thus to Claxby Church, St Mary's. This is open to the public and is an ancient and well-appointed edifice. A lovely place to rest your bones and say a quiet prayer and/or munch your sandwiches, and a charming churchyard to visit in summer too. A noticeboard tells of an "Evening of Entertainment" by local choirs on Wednesday, 17<sup>th</sup> December at 6.30 pm. "Minced pies and mulled wine".

Having recovered from your exertions so far, leave the church and take the footpath to the right at **G**, almost immediately. Then you will go through a series of gardens, fortunately well signed, so, with luck, expect no protestations, until you emerge on Normanby Rise at **H**. Follow the road for a short distance, then take the footpath to the right.

Here, there is a helpful sign telling you that there is a bull in the field, the last thing you need as you slog up a hundred metre ascent! Fortunately, the author encountered nary a cow. At the top (having recovered your breath), you head through a gate into one of Lincolnshire's smallest fields, then out the other side, and into Normanby le Wold, a tiny village, where you follow the horned helmet symbol of the Viking Way past St Peter's church. To the right here, there used to be a sign on the gate, "Never mind the dog, beware of the owner!" Alas, the sign has now gone, and there was sadly no sign of the little black doggie who used to quietly greet walkers with enthusiasm. Also, the church has scaffolding at one end and black plastic sheeting over the entrance, so it didn't look terribly inviting, though the author has visited it on a few occasions before and found it to be open and a delightful place to look around.

So, you pass St Peter's Church and follow the Viking Way path along the edge of the field, where there are dry stone walls on your left, not so common in Lincolnshire. To the left are views across this spur of land to the higher edge, and to the right, views over Market Rasen and on to Lincoln Cathedral on a clear day. Unfortunately, the author chose to doubt the weather forecast and the inclement weather he encountered led to misty views and getting reasonably wet! But in fine and/or dry weather, it is an outstanding route.

At **K**, you can take the right turn and follow the route you took at the beginning, or turn left and follow a narrow footpath down to a farm at **L**. Here, you take the rightmost path, which brings you back down to Moor Road, a short distance from the brown stone building mentioned at the beginning of this walk description.

There is a church in Walesby, St Mary's, which the author has yet to visit, but which definitely looks to be worth a look at, if you are the church-visiting kind.

However, above Walesby is a distinctive church, known as the Rambler's Church (actually, All Saints) on account of stained glass windows featuring hikers. It stands on the Viking Way and was described in the walk in the July 2022 edition of the Tetford Times. If this magazine reaches you in time, know that there is a service featuring the Gainsborough Salvation Army Citadel Band, no less, as well as the Da Capo Folk Group, and the Stonesthrow Folk Group. That takes place at 7 p.m. on Saturday, 13<sup>th</sup> December. It promises to be a lively evening! If not, look out for their next event; the church is a unique part of Lincolnshire heritage.

Although not spectacular by national standards, this walk is nevertheless notable in that the highest point in the *entire* Lincolnshire Wolds, "Wolds Top," is slightly north of the route, at **N**; 168 metres. It lies at the edge of a farmer's field, more or less adjoining Claxby Radar Station. The "Golf Ball" is visible for many miles and is now an Ordnance Survey GPS broadcaster, and may or may not be a BT microwave source, among other mysterious suggestions. Whatever, it is NOT open to the public!

Regrettably, neither Walesby nor Claxby have any kind of pub or shop, but you can head to nearby Tealby for the oldest thatched pub in Lincolnshire, the very popular King's Head.
